



Face coverings and dry skin

Face coverings now need to be worn in most indoor places, outside the home.^[1] They cover the nose and mouth, which are the main ways the virus causing COVID-19 is spread.

Wearing a face covering is leading to reports of skin irritation and the use of facial emollients (medical moisturisers) is recommended.^[2]



Follow these steps to look after your skin

- Use a frangrace-free emollient on your face after wearing a face covering.
- Apply the emollient with smooth downwards strokes, but do not rub it in.
- Avoid wearing make-up under your mask, as it may block skin pores.
- If your lips become dry, wear a fragrance-free lip salve or an emollient ointment.







If you already have a dry skin condition

- Cleanse your face by using your emollient as a soap substitute, and avoid the use of all soaps and detergents on your face.
- Continue using your prescribed skin treatment.
- If you have facial eczema that is made worse by wearing a face covering, the Government has exemption badges and cards on its website that you can print out.[3]
